**The Bucktail Brothers Series** combines *The Bucktail Brothers of the Fighting 149<sup>th</sup>* and *The Bucktail Brothers: Brave Men's Blood* into one great Civil War adventure. The whole history of the "New Bucktails" is included.

**The Bucktails: Perils on the Peninsula** details the original Bucktails' role in the 1862 Union evacuation of Virginia.

**The Bucktails at the Devil's Den** describes the heroics of the original Bucktails, the 42<sup>nd</sup> Pennsylvania Volunteers, on the second day's battle at Gettysburg.

**The Bucktails' Last Call** takes the original Bucktails through the Wilderness and Spotsylvania Court House campaigns to the end of their enlistment after the Battle of Bethesda Church on May 31, 1864.

**The 190<sup>th</sup> Bucktails: Catchin' Bobby Lee** continues the exploits of the original Bucktails who reenlist in the 190<sup>th</sup> PA Volunteers. After fighting at Petersburg and Five Forks, they defeat the Confederates at Appomattox on April 9, 1865.

**Attack in the Alleghenies** relates Colonel John Armstrong's destruction of Kittanning village from where the Delaware Indians raided Colonial Pennsylvania.
